Message from the Head of College



AUSCHWITZ

In February,
Josh and I got the
opportunity to visit
Auschwitz and
Auschwitz-Birkenau
for the day with other
Year 12 students
from schools around

the eastern area. The trip was run by the Holocaust Educational Trust on their Lessons from Auschwitz project, who aim to continue the legacy and memory of the events of the holocaust. Before leaving, we attended a seminar in London where we were briefed and given the opportunity to discuss our expectations for the trip. The majority of us anticipated that it would be very grey and eerie; however, in reality it was quite different.

On a Wednesday, we got up in the middle of the night and travelled to Poland by plane. Our first stop was to a synagogue where we learnt of life for inhabitants of the town of Oswiecim before Nazi control; we were shocked at how close Oswiecim was to the camp itself. Auschwitz one, which was the largest camp established by the Nazis in WW2, was our second stop. It was very surreal walking those same steps as millions of Jewish and other minority groups did - it was here we learnt about the prisoners' daily routine. We saw huge displays of their shoes, bags and even hair which made the experience so much more real. Despite our previous expectations, the camp was surrounded by greenery and the sun was even shining. After Auschwitz one, we took a short journey to the death camp Auschwitz-Birkenau.

In comparison to Auschwitz one, Birkenau was double the size and had a more reflective atmosphere. It was mostly empty land as the majority of the evidence of execution was destroyed before liberation in 1945, but the feeling of memorial was still strong. To end the day, we all gathered together and held a ceremony, not just for the holocaust victims but for victims of persecution from across history. We thought of the legacy we hold as the last generation who will get to meet real survivors of the war and holocaust and the importance of continuing to remember the awful events caused by discrimination to prevent them from happening again. Although only a brief visit, our experience will be something we will never forget.

A dance workshop led by 2Faced Dance Company member David Allwood, on 4 March 2014, was a huge success with the students. David writes...

I had the pleasure of visiting your school to take a 2Faced Dance Company workshop for the BTEC and GCSE Dance students, as well as the boys Dance group. I am a professional dancer from London and have worked for many companies and shows; such as, Starlight Express, The X Factor and 2Faced Dance Company for over 5 years. In this time, I have taught at many schools and colleges, taking workshops and choreographing dance pieces for their productions and courses.

On this occasion, I worked with the dancers on creating an original piece for them based on the concept and ideas presented in the song 'Get Down' by James Arthur. After a rigorous warm up and body conditioning session... which involved lots of shrieks of pain and moans and groans... we started learning

combinations that would go into the routine. The first was a hip-hop and breakdance sequence which was very new for the dancers and out of their comfort zone. I also created a contemporary routine that they picked up incredibly quickly. They were also keen to help me adapt and change it to suit their individual style. We also worked on partner work and using other dancers as our base for support; this is a big feature of 2Faced Dance Company. There was a very high standard of dance ability and some extremely talented students. Despite time constraints, we managed to create a complete piece and it worked very well. The dancers said they really enjoyed it and that they had learned a lot... I don't think they liked it so much the next morning when all of their muscles ached! NO PAIN. NO GAIN!!

I hope to come back to the school for more workshops in the future as I thoroughly enjoyed this workshop and feel that Arthur Mellows Village College has some extremely good dancers!

Our guest speaker this year was Mr Richard Hutchinson, an ex-student and 'Old Boy' of Arthur Mellows (1965 – 1972) and currently an Employment

Mr Hutchinson was Head Boy at Arthur Mellows in 1972; studying at Arthur Mellows from 1965 to 1972, he left with A Levels in Geography, History and Maths. Mr Hutchinson went on to study at Sheffield University, graduating in 1975 with a BA (Law) Hons degree. He then went on to train with Warren and Allen Solicitors in Nottingham and qualified as a Solicitor in 1979.

In 1983, Mr Hutchinson became a Partner in the practice Maclaren Warner; he was appointed as a fee paid Employment Judge in 1993. In 1999, Mr Hutchinson set up his own niche Employment Law practice; he was appointed as a salaried Employment Judge in 2010. He is now based at the Nottingham Employment Tribunal.

The College has moved on a great deal since Mr Hutchinson was a student, not only in the size of the student body, but also in terms of the resources and excellent facilities offered to young

people to help them achieve their maximum potential. The College was honoured that Richard Hutchison was able to be the Guest Speaker at this event.

Head of College, Mr Sandeman said;

"Academic results for the College are only one indication of success. In other areas, particularly sporting and cultural, many individuals and groups of students have been involved at all levels. Their participation resulted in a large number of awards which reflected most positively upon themselves and the College. In addition to these achievements, Robin Barber (Year 9) made it through to the Pink Kangaroo round and Dylan Dhokia (Year 11) to the Maclaurin round for their high scores on the challenge. This is only the third time a student has made it through to the Pink Kangaroo Round and Dylan is the first student ever to get through to the Maclaurin Round in Arthur Mellows' history. The first round of this national challenge entered is by

thousands of Gifted and Talented students across the country and worldwide. Only a small proportion of the highest scoring students qualify for the second round, so both students did really well to qualify to this next stage.

Dylan's success continued in this second round of the competition with him achieving a Merit certificate for his high score. For Dylan to gain a Merit in this challenge is an incredible achievement because only the top 25% of participants receive an award. We would like to congratulate Dylan on his success, particularly as he had to complete additional work outside the classroom to help him prepare for this challenge.

To give you some indication of the mathematical prowess Dylan demonstrated, one of the questions Dylan answered correctly is shown below:

A regular hexagon, with sides of length 2cm, is cut into two pieces by a straight parallel to one of its sides. The ratio of the area of the smaller piece to the area of the larger piece is 1:5. What is the length of the cut?
