Can I wish everyone a happy Easter break.



As well as being given handouts to take away with us, we all made a lot of notes on the day and the lecturers posed questions which made us think about some of the things we had covered in class.


We all enjoyed the day (especially the Burger King lunch—Sam Jarrett) and believe it will benefit us when we come to sit the exam in the Summer

Bistro Experience Evenings

It is quite incredible to believe that the Bistro Evenings have become so successful in such a short space of time. To date, we have run five Bistro Experiences, involving 40 different students, catering for almost 200 diners. Our mailing list and advance bookings have grown to such an extent that we have filled our capacity for the last two evenings and the two remaining evenings are provisionally well booked, too.

The students involved in the Bistro Evenings are currently following GCSE and A Level Food Technology. The experience provides these enthusiastic young chefs with the opportunity to work alongside Steve Collins (Cucina Chef) to devise a high quality and sophisticated menu, that they then produce and serve to paying diners (the current rate is £12.50 for 3 courses and tea/coffee). If your child is currently studying Food and would like to be involved in a future Bistro Experience, please encourage them to speak to Mrs Clark (Head of Food).

Our diners' feedback has been extremely positive and any constructive suggestions have been used to continue to improve the quality of the service that we offer. The students who have been involved so far have enjoyed the experience and usually want to know when they can do it again. Although they do primarily only get the one experience in the kitchen, they also have the opportunity to work front of house at the subsequent Bistro evening.

BATTLEFIELDS

There are way too many things to fit in to talk about, but I will do my best to tell you as much as I can. When I first got told I was going on the Battlefields trip I was of course really excited! I didn't really realise how much the sights we would see would affect me until we arrived. Our first stop in Belgium was The Albert Memorial, Nieuwport – start of the Western Front. Our guide Neil was simply amazing; his explanation of the Memorial, I personally found very interesting. We then got a chance to climb to the top canals; this gave us a great view of the Prince Albert statue in the middle of the Memorial.



Our next stop was Belgium Cemetery, Ramskapelle, which was breathtaking — the amount of Flemish and Belgian graves was unreal! It's impossible to get your head around, but we hadn't seen anything yet, as Miss Price pointed out to us when she saw the look on our faces.

After a long day of travelling the Hotel Oude Abdij, where we were staying, was a welcomed sight. Everyone was told to just grab a bag and get inside as it was raining pretty hard by this point. Out of all the suitcases that were taken in, it had to be mine that got dropped in a massive puddle and ended up soaking wet! Great. After unpacking my very wet suitcase, and settling down into our lovely rooms, we got served a lovely tea. Soup for starters, chicken and chips for mains then Cornetto ice cream for pudding...YUM! Everyone was shattered by this point and most people went to bed straight away, including me!

Day two, the birds were singing, the sun was shining and it was very early. Nevertheless, we were all keen to get on with the day's agenda. Our first place to visit was Essex Farm CWGC Cemetery and casualty-clearing station 'In Flanders Fields' Museum. Neil (our amazing guide!) explained that this hospital was a place where the soldiers could quickly come and get 'patched up' then go back and fight. The hospital was a safe place because it was just behind the

trenches, meaning it wasn't far for the soldiers to go and get some medical attention. Next on the list was the Menin Gate. For me, this was the most upsetting and amazing sight both at the same time; the sheer volume of names on the walls of the Menin Gate was unbelievable. So many brave young men gave their lives fighting for their country. Amazing. We then got some free time in Ypres to explore the many little shops. This was great fun and we found an ice cream shop that did more flavours than was imaginable! I had two scoops of chocolate and one cookie...it didn't last long!

On Wednesday 16 February 2011 three retired members of staff, Steve Smith, Mick Lewin and I toured the College at the kind invitation of Mr McLaren (Chair of Governors) to see the new buildings. It was a most enjoyable experience and left us impressed with the positive changes that had taken place.

During my time at Arthur Mellows (1962—1993), I witnessed many changes to a school of less than six hundred pupils and twenty seven staff to one of over a thousand pupils, the corresponding increase in staff and, of course, many necessary building projects but I was amazed at the alterations and improvements in recent years.

The older parts of the building have been skilfully incorporated with the new and by replacing the dark flooring and installing light wood framed windows on the classroom corridors, with their attractive patterned glass, there is a welcome impression of greater space and light.

Of the many remarkable improvements we saw, three deserve a special mention. The transformation of the old dinning room and kitchens into the wonderful Sixth Form facility, the superb staff and pupil dining space and the very attractive paved Courtyard area on the south side of the College.

Staff and pupils are indeed fortunate to have such well-equipped and pleasant surroundings; the whole ambience of the College suggests it is a happy and civilised place to work.

When the opportunity arose to work with a real-life BBC news reporter, it was impossible to resist. The fact that he was a former Arthur Mellows student whose face regularly appears on national news broadcasts certainly helped convince a number of our Year 11 Media BTEC students that this would be a great learning opportunity and an invaluable insight into the vocational real-life media world that the BTEC course is supposedly all about.

The project was part of the national BBC School Report initiative, pairing reporters with aspiring journalists in schools to prepare a series of news broadcasts by students to be shown on News Report Day, Thursday 24 March 2011.

A number of enthusiastic Year 11 students; (**Kelly Barnett, Sarah Duerden and Hannah West**) came forward and, after brainstorming ideas and potential stories, met up with **Anthony Bartram** who works out of the BBC East Midlands office, who are hopefully hosting our Year 10 BTEC students later in the year. It was fascinating to see how a media professional shaped the story idea from a proposal into a workable idea, and it was heartening to see the students rising to the occasion as they developed an idea about the potential closure of RAF Wittering into a tightly-structured production schedule.

We contacted RAF Wittering, who were extremely helpful in setting up a series of interviews with military personnel and civilians on the base at very short notice, all of whom were really supportive. The students visibly grew in confidence as they conducted one interview after another, and it was interesting to see how quickly they became increasingly proficient in interview technique and various technical aspects of setting up shots.

Back at school, the group of students, now joined by **Olivia Rimes** and **Gail Odep**, spent a day off timetable shaping the footage into a coherent story. In the end, they did a terrific job, as you can see by checking out their work on the College website. Our thanks to Anthony Bartram for the excellent support and advice he offered throughout the process. Thanks also to Tony Walsh at RAF Wittering who was extremely generous with his time and advice during the filming process, really helping to push the students to do a highly professional job.
