Term Ends Friday 27 March 2015 STUDENTS ENTERING AND EXITING COLLEGE PREMISES AND THOSE USING CAR TRANSPORT TO GET TO AND FROM SCHOOL

Parents are reminded that all students, with the exception of those who travel to and from the College in a taxi or who have a medical need, should be entering / exiting the College premises at the start and end of the day via one of the designated student pathways. Students should not enter or exit via Main Reception doors. Similarly, parents should not arrange to drop off or collect their child from the parking area in front of Main Reception – this area is not accessible to general traffic during the hours of 8.30 am and 9.00 am in the mornings and 2.30 pm and 3.30 pm in the afternoons.

To help aid any confusion, students who travel to and from the College in taxis, or who have a medical need requiring them to use the Main Reception, have been issued with a pass which they will need to show. Any student without a pass will be requested to exit via the correct route.

Your assistance in delivering this message to your son / daughter and arranging an alternative place to drop off and collect by car (other than Main Reception) would be appreciated. Whilst writing, I would take the opportunity to also ask parents to be mindful of the parking restrictions on Helpston Road, keeping clear of highway zigzag lines and traffic signage. These necessary measures are in place to protect the safety of all users and to ensure an accident does not happen at the start and end of the school day.

The EU Mock Counc

The EU Mock Council gives students a taste of what international politics is like by simulating a real meeting of the Council of the European Union. The event was attended by 30 schools and colleges, each representing either an EU member state, the European Commission or the General Secretariat. The participating students discussed and debated 2 topics from the position of the state that they were representing.

The participating students from Arthur Mellows were Amber Vella and Joe Carter. Please read their account of the event:

Upon being chosen to represent both our school and the country of Romania at the EU Mock Council on Monday 8 December 2014, we both jumped on the opportunity to research fascinating topics that we might not have come across in our general academic studies. The Mock Council was held in the Locarno Suite of the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, an environment which was both daunting and inspiring to be in amongst other schools, as well as prominent figures from the world European politics including Minister for Europe, David Lidington, and Head of EC Representation in the UK, Jacqueline Minor, as well as representatives from embassies. One of these representatives was in fact from the Romanian embassy who was therefore able to provide invaluable insight into Romania stance on the policies that we would be debating.

Having done extensive research before the event and forming our own opinions on the proposals, we were fully prepared to make our case. We split into two separate groups, each one of us arguing Romania's case on a different set of proposals. One of us debated policies relating to the treatment of juveniles in criminal proceedings, whilst the other focused on energy efficiency across the EU. Lunch also allowed a more informal opportunity to debate the proposals, and even form alliances with other member states. Having both taken our opportunities to speak, and despite being slightly intimidated by the photographers and film crews documenting the entire day, we were very satisfied with how we had represented Romania. We both felt that we had made a difference to the end result.
