You will have read in my 'Welcome Back' letter in September about the record breaking examination results this year. I was extremely proud to be the Head of this College on the two days in August when our young people celebrated outstanding achievement, with the majority of our Sixth Form being successful with their University choices. The Year 11 students achieved record breaking results (90% 5 A* to C grades and 63% 5 A* to C grades including Maths and English) and many of them have now settled into their studies in the new Year 12.

We have just held an extremely successful Open Evening for prospective admissions next September, with approximately 1000 visitors on site for presentations and to look around. The students who took part in showcasing the College and it's facilities should be congratulated on the way they conducted themselves. The College goes from strength to strength and I look forward to another very successful year at Arthur Mellows.

There are over 6000 languages spoken in the world, and behind each and every one of them lies a rich and diverse culture. That's what the European Day of Languages aims to celebrate - by showing people across Europe how important languages are, and what fun can be had learning them.

Here at the College the Languages Department was visited by Years 5 and 6 pupils from Barnack, Glinton and Northborough primary schools, who enjoyed taster sessions in both French and German. The children participated in interactive games, activities and quizzes and in just one morning could name items of clothing, animals and numbers in two different languages. The language teachers were very lucky to be assisted by some helpful Sixth Form students, who received payment in pain au chocolat! As well as all the fantastic language learning, the primary pupils also had time for a quick break in the Refectory with a Danish pastry. For many, this was their first experience of language learning and of AMVC, both of which they all found very positive and enjoyable.

All around the College both staff and pupils were encouraged to take pride in their linguistic skills and greeted each other in different languages. Some teachers incorporated a European theme into their lessons and pupils whose families speak foreign languages at home (such as Mandarin and Shona) taught them to others. At lunchtime, rather than the usual Friday serving of fish and chips, the Refectory served up a continental feast of French onion soup, Coq au Vin, Bratwurst hotdogs and Belgian waffles. by all and we are looking forward to next year.

I met all the councillors on the Cabinet. They were all really friendly and made me feel important. They were looking at a Media Pack to update the public on recent activities. One item which I found particularly interesting was a discussion on landfill sites where a number of councillors debated on where it should go.

I was shocked that another decision on the local Gas service, to cut costs, had taken 4 years to come to a final decision, due to the number of people involved in deciding upon this issue and the number of processes it had to go through.

I learnt that it takes a lot of people to make something happen, for example 'The Great Eastern Run' on Sunday caused discussion of policing, litter control, whose responsibility it was, and who was to get paid.

The experience has made me interested in Politics, possibly applying to be the next Youth MP.



A message from your local Policeman

Dear Students....Some of you may have seen me walking around the College at the start and end of the day and wondered why the Police are needed? Part of my role as your local bobby on the beat is to ensure the safety of everyone going about their daily business.

This includes those who travel to and from the College on the buses provided. They are now all fitted with seatbelts and therefore they must be worn by law. I have jumped on a few buses as you leave at the end of the day and generally most students are not wearing their seatbelts. You really must get into the habit of doing so, they are there to save your life and that of the person in front of you. If the driver has to stop suddenly it will keep you in your seat and prevent you from flying forwards at great speed and hitting the person sitting in front of you. Seatbelts save lives, they must be worn. The penalty for not wearing a seatbelt has been increased now to a £60 fine! I will continue to keep randomly checking as you leave the College and persistent offenders will be notified to staff and risk a possible fine.

It will also soon be getting darker as the seasons change. For those that cycle into College please can you ensure that you have safety lights fitted when having to cycle in the dark or in poor visibility. Consider wearing something that is bright so motorists can clearly see you. You can also buy fluorescent items that stick onto rucksacks so you can be clearly seen when cycling in the Winter. I have also noticed many students tend to cycle with their safety helmets attached to their handlebars rather then wearing them! Please wear your cycle helmet, they really do keep you safe. Again they are there for your safety and I do not like having to go to serious injury accidents involving students that I know and having to watch the ambulance crew trying to piece you back together!

I enjoy policing AMVC and if I am not busy checking seatbelts or cycle helmets then I am more than willing to chat to you as you come and go from College.
