

#### **Year 9 Enigma Day**

On Thursday 2 July a group of Year 9 Gifted and Talented students went to the Thomas Deacon Academy for an exciting day of code-breaking and problem-solving. The day began with a talk led by a professional mathematician from Cambridge University who explained the history of codes and ciphers. It was then we got our first glance of a genuine World War 2 Enigma machine from 1936 which was used in Nazi Germany. After that, we enjoyed a session of code breaking using many different types of codes from throughout the ages. Some were quite easy to solve but some took a lot longer and really got us thinking. We also got a chance




to solve different puzzles provided by the Millenium Maths Project. Although they looked simple they actually required a lot of perseverance and hard work. Finally, we looked at Morse code and learnt a card trick that really impressed us.


The day made us look at maths in a new light and showed us there's a lot more to maths than learning formulas and equations.


We returned to Arthur Mellows on Wednesday having had a fantastic time. Thank you to all the students who were a real credit to the school and who made this such a successful trip.



#### **Primary School Sports**


Once again the sporting calendar for primary school events has been very busy over this academic year. There has been at least one event for every pupil in every Year Group in our 9 main feeder primary schools:

#### The AMVC Bistro Experience


On Thursday 2 July, eight Year 11 students participated in the first AMVC Bistro Experience. The aim of the evening was to provide GCSE Food Technology students with an opportunity to utilise their skills by working in the Cucina kitchen to prepare and serve food at an evening function. The students: Jamie Andrews. Charlotte Child, Claire Cooke, Dominic Edge, David Fear, Tom Gillespie, Edward Hewitt and Ryan Lenton worked alongside Cucina Unit Manager, Steve Collins to design, prepare and serve a quality three course menu to thirty guests. In initial meetings with Steve, the students selected a menu which showed not only a high understanding of how to compliment flavours and textures but also drew upon the students' knowledge of different cultures and tastes. One guest commented that: "It showed imagination and flair to attempt the contemporary flavours and



presentation". Once the menu had been determined, the students attended school for two afternoons prior to the evening to prepare the ingredients (which included peeling lots of potatoes, honing their knife skills while finely slicing vegetables and organising the washing up) and ensure tasks were allocated.

On the evening itself, the students arrived promptly at 5.00 pm to begin the final preparations. Dressed in their chef whites, the atmosphere was 'buzzing'; the students worked professionally and energetically to produce three imaginative and high quality courses. Teamwork was imperative and the students worked superbly to support one another as the deadline of 7.00 pm approached. By 6.45 pm a final debriefing was held and everything was ready.

The thirty guests started to arrive and it was evident that they were looking forward to the evening. With the tables close to the kitchen, so that the students' progress could be closely observed, the quests chatted and relaxed in the refectory. #### Year 7 Fund raising for Kisoro Hospital in Uganda


In the last couple of months our Year 7 students have been given the challenge of raising funds for a struggling hospital in Kisoro, Uganda.

are not enough beds, and there are not enough doctors or nurses.




The initial target for this year was £250, but the running total to date is £700, with more money still to be collected! This means that so many more patients will benefit from our caring and imaginative students.
