Parents may remember that in September 2012 we introduced the variation in uniform for Key Stage 4 of a black jumper / cardigan and for the girls, a white blouse/white polo shirt. At the time this change was not compulsory but an option for parents and students if they wished to adopt the new styles. Our intention was for it to become a compulsory change as from September 2013.



This change in style and colour for Key Stage 4 only has proved extremely popular with students, and, therefore, for those students going through into Key Stage 4 this coming September, the variation of the black jumper / cardigan and white blouse/polo shirt will continue. 

1-0 score line to England. There were no cards fortunately and the assessor's feedback was generally positive. After 12 minutes we walked back out ready for the second half.

The second half was slightly busier with a Yellow card about 10 seconds after the kick off for unsporting behaviour due to a reckless tackle. This was right in front of me so it was my choice for the free kick and caution given to the referee across the coms set.

The first substitution occurred about 12 minutes into the second half with one of Scotland's players. I used the coms set to ask for it and assistant John Brooks was also there to help. It went smoothly and was followed by many others by both teams.

Around 15 minutes from the end, there was a penalty for the day before between Arsenal and QPR in the premier Scotland due to a reckless tackle by the England league. When we were back in the changing room, kit goalkeeper. It was my job to record the cautions and at the end of the game there were 3 in total, the 3rd for dissent. > The game finished 3-2 to England after a fantastic winning goal 3 minutes from the end. There was also 3 minutes added time which went cleanly. After the celebrations from the England team and the shaking of hands, we stayed out for the presentations.

> The presentations included a fantastic International cap which I am sure I will treasure for the rest of my life. The officials were called up first to collect them followed by Scotland and then England. We went back into the changing rooms knowing a good job had been done.

> We said goodbye after a fantastic experience before a 3 hour journey home.

After waking up eagerly around 8.00 am on the morning of the game, excitement kicked in and there was no way of getting back to sleep. I had prepared my kit bag the night before with referees kit, warm-up gear and other accessories needed for the day. This included boots which had never been as clean as they were the night before. I left at 10.00 am anticipating a 3 hour drive up to Nantwich, near Stoke-on-Trent. After a quick 'accidental' detour around Spaghetti junction, Birmingham, I arrived at the ground around 2 hours before kick-off.

Impatiently, I got out the car and got guided towards the officials' changing room where there were drinks and a programme to read, the other 3 officials turned up. It was nice to see them for the first time and they instantly included me in their 'professional game' banter. After a successful year on the new GCSE media Studies course with the Year 10 students, I decided to run a trip to see the highly-rated Harry Potter tour in Watford as a reward and to reinforce the work we have been doing this year. I should confess at this point that I am not a huge fan of the Harry Potter films so I didn't go with great expectations. I know that some of you may find this a shocking admission, in which case I apologise humbly, but — much like the original books — I like them for what they are, but they just don't hold any special magic for me, which is ironic given the subject matter.



I need not have worried. The studio tour is fantastic. You don't need to be a fan of the films to appreciate the extraordinary skill that has gone into bringing

the books to life. The tour itself is incredibly slick, the best-organised UK attraction I have been to, with well-trained staff and a cleverly designed tour, which begins with an entertaining short film before you enter the great hall at Hogwarts. The attention to detail is extra-ordinary, and does a great job of showing how the sets and props are constructed to explain how filming takes place to create the illusion of reality without actually spoiling the films by revealing too much. The stage designers and technical crew from the CGI experts down to the lowliest carpenter are all rightly celebrated for the loving skill with which they have used their talents to create a rich and vibrant world.

The tour moves on with a fascinating exhibition of various locations and props, from Hagrid's hut to the potions room, the Purple Night Bus and a full scale reconstruction of Diagon Alley. A particular highlight is the green screen area where you can don a cape and ride a broomstick or ride the Ford Anglia through the skies above the Hogwarts Express, though my favourite part was the area which showed the technical drawings and card models of the main locations. Whether you are studying the media, graphic design, resistant materials or even Travel and Tourism, it is hard to imagine anyone not finding something here to capture their imagination. The students, as ever, were infectiously enthusiastic and had a great time, and I am already looking forward to October when the next cohort of GCSE media students get their turn to enjoy my current favourite UK tourist attraction.



In 1986 disaster struck Belarus, making it contaminated. Now nowhere is safe to go, and nothing is safe to eat or drink. The fires released

5% of the radioactive reactor core into the atmosphere. That day the wind was blowing north causing Belarus to become contaminated. Chernobyl is north of



Ukraine causing it to spread

over Belarus.

Now the land, water, air and food is contaminated making it hard to grow food and find fresh safe water. Due to the devastation, these people need help finding healthy uncontaminated food.

A charity has been set up in England to help bring children over from Belarus to the UK for a month every year. This helps to clear their body of radioactive waste and give them fresh food and clean water. Every time they come over here just for a month, it gives them an extra couple of years onto their life expectancy. We send them back with vitamins to last them a whole year until their next visit and clothes for themselves, and for their close family. The Charity also sends them back with seeds to plant (it is sometimes hard to find good food and crops) and enough money to help them buy some food and essential items.



Arabic Club

NEWS FROM THE GOVERNORS

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE

This committee has recommended to the Full Governing Body a robust and challenging budget for the next financial year. This has been set against a longer term view of forecast budgets for the next 3 years, which currently indicate an increasing drop in funding, despite being told in the media that funding for education is ring fenced. This is primarily due to the proposed change in the Pupil Premium funding, from which Arthur Mellows does not benefit as much as other similar schools in the area, but of course there are other significant aspects. However, with a strong management team, the College is well placed to take any necessary action to ensure that we protect the educational standards that we



expect your children to achieve whilst attending Arthur Mellows. Ostensibly the change in funding will mean that the sterling efforts which have been made in increasing and uplifting the fabric of the College will now invariably come to an end. Rest assured that the Senior Management Team will continue to control, monitor and review the funding situation, assessing the impact and risks that may have to be faced, so that the Arthur Mellows can continue to focus on its College Improvement Plan.
