Mad Medics Project! Arthur Mellows is delighted to be working with Jack Hunt School and Peterborough Museum on the Mad Medics Project. This project is an opportunity for some of our most able students to investigate GCSE topics in Year 8.

The Challenge:

To create a short film to explain how the old Peterborough hospital, now fits into the history of medicine, both locally and nationally.

It all started with a Trip to Long on Monday 9 December 2013, to see The Old Operating Theatre. The students watched a performance explaining how the theatre was used. We learnt many gory and fascinating details such as; Why

the operating theatre was in the attic of a chapel, and the importance of speed in operations before anaesthetics. Apparently the record for a leg amputation was 2 minutes. The students then had a chance to look at the displays showing how medicine has changed through time.

Later that day the students also had a chance to go on a history of

medicine with expert guides. When we visited the Peterborough Museum, the students worked with Museum staff to learn all about the museum's history and the

Victorian operating theatre. The students heard dramatic stories of inventions, tragic deaths and amazing recoveries. After lunch, the students split into two teams to start filming. It was girls vs. boys to see who could come up with the best

story and film to bring the museum's past as Peterborough's main hospital back to life. Back at school, the students set about work in earnest with scripting and planning sessions. We hope to return to Peterborough Museum after Christmas for one last visit for filming. The students will then tackle the tricky business of editing, for most a completely new experience. We really look forward to sharing our next update with you and the videos that the students have made. So watch this space!

The trip was awesome, I had a great time!

Overall the whole trip was brilliant but there were a few things that I enjoyed the most and this was the Old Operating Theatre, as I found it very fascinating as I and others were told the history of the place and how it was a church with an operating theatre where in the olden days upcoming surgeons learnt the tricks of the trade.

I was also quite fascinated about how they operated in those days with a very small amount of scientific knowledge and also the way they performed it was quite gruesome. As well as the Old Operating Theatre, I enjoyed the historical tour around London and seeing some of the more modern sights including the amazing Shard and the Tower Bridge. Overall it was a great day.

I really enjoyed the trip as a whole - for many reasons. One reason was because the demonstration (in the Old St. Thomas's operating theatre) was really clear and I felt it was full of information and stuff that could help us make our piece of media. The same with the tour/talk about the old hospital and Guy's hospital. I learnt many things; all of which, I found really interesting. One of the things I learnt was, before the hospitals in England had rooms fully dedicated to operating (operating theatres), they would simply just operate behind a screen in the actual ward. Also they would not really give their patients' bed linen a really good wash, neither would they wash their operating tools properly. Another thing I found out was that the longest surgery they did was 6 minutes long, and the fastest was called speed surgery (on average lasted 2 minutes) but the fastest time that a surgery was completed was in around 30 seconds. I felt completely privileged to be asked to go on this trip and help us make an excellent piece of media.

RETINA DANCE WORKSHOP





FREE SCHOOL MEALS

If your child is entitled to free school meals but you are reluctant to take advantage of this entitlement, talk to us about your concerns. We will try to put your mind at rest. If you still decide not to take the free school meals we still encourage you to apply. You don't have to accept the free school meals but it will show on our records as being entitled. The more children who are shown as being entitled to free school meals, the more funding the school will receive. This ultimately benefits your children.

You are entitled to free school meals for your children if you receive:

- Income Support
- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, an annual income below £16,190 and no **Working Tax Credit.**
- **Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)**
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act

Please note: If you, or your partner, receive any working tax credit you will not be entitled to free school meals. This condition has been set by the Government and is outlined in the Education Act 2002.

The application form must be completed by the person who receives the qualifying benefit which can be requested from the Finance Department.

MATHS ADVANTAGE FOR STUDENTS WHO READ FOR PLEASURE

You may have seen the recent report which suggested that children who read for pleasure are likely to do better in Maths and Science, as well as English, than those who rarely read in their free time.

The study, by the Institute of Education, London University, examined the reading habits of 6,000 children. It indicated reading for pleasure was more important to a child's development than how educated their parents were. To find out more, there are some great articles at www.bbc.co.uk/news/education. With all the negative press about the education system in Britain, as parents we need to do all we can to encourage our children to read for pleasure. With this in mind, why not give your child the lifelong (and free) gift this Christmas of encouraging them to read? It really is the key to success at school.






Holocaust Remembrance Day

On Monday 16 December 2013, Eva Clarke visited Arthur Mellows to tell her amazing life story to Year 9 students. Eva came in to talk to us about the Second World War and life in concentration camps, and to make sure nothing like that ever happens again. What makes her story so remarkable is that she is a survivor of the Holocaust; in fact, she was born in a transit camp weighing only three pounds to her mother who, at nine months pregnant, weighed only five stones!

As Jews, her family were at risk from the Nazis, who sent postcards telling them to go to their local train stations, without knowing the trains

would take them to a transit camp where they would end up living and working for three



At the camp, the Nazis separated the men and women but Eva's mother was pregnant for the first time, with a boy. If you became pregnant the Nazis would

take the baby away and kill them, and possibly the parents would get sent to a gas chamber. Five other women were also pregnant and got their children killed, but Eva's mother's child was not taken away, though sadly he died two months later. Eva's mother was lucky enough to get offered a job, so it was unlikely she would be sent to the gas chambers, and then she was moved to another camp two weeks before the end of the war. On the train to the camp she gave birth to Eva. During her time in Auschwitz, she even met Dr Mengele, a famous Nazi officer who was interested in genetics and experimented on twins and people with different coloured eyes, which as a twin myself, I found really disturbing.

Eva's story was really horrifying, but also quite uplifting because she and her mother survived and went on
 to live amazing lives. In fact, this was Eva's 25th visit to a school since September, to tell people her

family's extraordinary story and hopefully prevent anything so terrible from ever being allowed to happen again. Sadly, Eva's mother passed away earlier this year, but it was obvious that she was an amazing woman, and her memory and story of hope lives on.
