We are the only school in Peterborough to have received this award, which is recognised by external bodies, such as Ofsted, as a mark of quality provision and only the 274th school nationally, many of which have independent or grammar school status. Challenge Award schools sustain success and continue to improve; the self-evaluation framework ensures that we continue to revise and develop our provision for the more able, using the NACE framework of quality assurance.

Staff, parents, students and Governors were instrumental in pulling together the evidence for this award and meeting with the Assessors. A huge thank you goes to everyone involved, though particular mention goes to Mrs Sarah Reilly, Assistant Headteacher, who was the lead for this initiative and was responsible for collating the evidence to meet with the specific criteria we were provided with.




CHARITY EVENT: CLIC SARGENT

BOOK REVIEW: LIFE OF PI BY YANN MARTEL

A boy. A boat. A Bengal tiger. These are the basic elements of Yann Martel's magnificently absurd masterpiece 'Life of Pi'. After a cargo ship sinks in the Pacific Ocean, Piscine Patel finds himself stranded on a lifeboat with the only survivors: a zebra, an orangutan, a hyena and a Bengal tiger. Before too long, Pi and Richard Parker, the tiger, are all that is left. They become companions in a small boat floating on a seemingly endless ocean, in an adventure which takes in flying fish and carnivorous islands. Although 'Life of Pi', for the majority of the novel, has only 2 characters, only one of which is human, it is a strangely enthralling and emotional read. A story which is at once heartbreaking and hilarious; with all the comedic brilliance that could be expected from a tale about the relationship between a precocious teen and a 450 pound tiger.

Now out as a film by Ang Lee, Life of Pi is a book that demands reading first.

New York, New York

The Daily Mail published an article last week condemning school trips to New York as a waste of time. In that context, this seventh trip for Media studies A Level students was weird because we seemed to have an amazingly educational time. Between Wednesday afternoon when we arrived and Saturday afternoon when we left, the trip incorporated a film-making session with a successful Manhattan based film and music video production company, Hayden 5, which followed a tour of film and TV locations around the city, looking at technical - and practical - aspects of filming in a major city in which film and TV is a \$5 billion industry. Our guide, Gary, even had a couple of lines in the recent blockbuster movie, 'The Bourne Legacy'!

We also took in architecture and design – visiting the amazing newly built Museum of Moving Image in Queens and the even newer Jay Z owned Barclays Center in Brooklyn, where we watched the Brooklyn Nets beat the Chicago Bulls in an NBA showdown.

The previous evening, we checked out Manhattan's subcultural scene, watching The Vaccines bring their UK indie rock to an adoring crowd of New York 'hipsters'. On the last day, we paid our respects at Ground Zero, bizarrely described by the tour guide as a 'sacred' site, alongside a group of Amish visitors, an intriguing clash between the modern vibrancy of New York and the simple rural life of a community who embrace a way of life so traditional that they don't even own cars. It remains a solemn and moving reminder of the clash of ideologies which has marked the start of the 21st century, though it was hard not to laugh at our tickets, which were booked under Arthur Mellows Village Cottage. Americans have such a charming view of life in England. A splinter group also took in the delights of the Metropolitan Museum of Art which featured works from classical times through to the European Renaissance, and Modern Artists such as Andy Warhol.

As ever, the students were a pleasure to be with, and infectiously excitable as they enjoyed each and every aspect of New York life. On our return, one student described it as the best 4 days of her life, which says it all. A waste of time? Hardly.

JAXON SIMMONS SWIMMING

Jaxon Simmons (8KCL) is ma big strides in the world of swin and England Disability swimming

Jaxon did not start swimming competitively until the end of Year 6, when he was spotted at school swimming sessions. He then began attending sessions at the Regional Pool. His strength comes from his determination and natural athleticism, which is a result of him not letting his eyesight problems get to him, and his competing in Athletics and Football all through junior school. Jaxon is now training up to 12 hours a week with the City of Peterborough swimming team. He competes regularly in individual and club galas whilst also being called on to represent Team East - The East of England Disability swimming team. As a swimmer of this calibre, Jaxon regularly receives visits from the ASA England Swimming Disability team workers, who monitor his progress and work with his coach. As a result of these visits Jaxon has now been invited on the ASA Talent Development programme. Athletes selected for the Home Nations Talent programme are seen as potentially possessing the skills and ability to progress onto the British Disability Swimming World Class programme. The programme will provide opportunities to develop his talent and help him progress to the highest level possible.

Jaxon currently holds the record for his classification S13 (visually impaired) in the following races for 50m, 100m freestyle and 100m and 200m individual medley, which he set recently during the Nationals held at Sheffield in November 2012.

In March, this year, Jaxon will be swimming in the British Gas International swim meet in Leeds, where his focus will be freestyle and individual medley races. We wish Jaxon the best of luck at the British Gas International and with his current target to represent GB at the next Paralympics.

Obviously this would be scary for anyone, but since she was very young, football has always been a passion of Megan's even being spotted by the Chelsea training programme when she was 9. She was also half way through her first season with Milton Keynes Dons girls Centre of Excellence u17s. The thought of not playing anymore was awful. Megan had many operations and 2 blood transfusions and said that every time she woke up she would feel to check her leg was there. Luckily, the doctors managed to save her leg, but told her she would never play football again.

Megan was completely devastated, but worked extremely hard in physio, training and rehab of her leg, and over many months beat the Doctor's diagnosis and began to kick the ball around again. But even that wasn't quite enough. With continued physio, Megan set a goal to get back into the MK Dons girls Centre of Excellence. After a short trial period she was offered a place again and now trains two nights a week and plays weekend matches too, against the best girls' teams in the country.

As a result of all this hard work and dedication, Megan has been impressing the people of Peterborough. Recently, she has been nominated for Young Footballer of the Year in the Peterborough Telegraph (this honour has

never been won by a girl). Megan has made the final three thanks to all the support she has received, so fingers crossed that she wins it for the icing of the cake of a hard come back.

So even if I don't know very much about football, what I do know is that Megan is an absolute model of what you can do if you work hard and put your mind to something. Well done Megan.
