
We are also in the process of surveying our Year 7 families on the primary to secondary transition process and feedback from this exercise will be incorporated in the planning for our new intake.

Most of you perhaps never knew Duncan. He taught PE but worked primarily as the College's Community Education Co-ordinator at AMVC from the late 1980s until he left in 1998 to become a Deputy Head near Watford. Duncan was very popular amongst staff and students; he got involved in school visits abroad, played for the staff football team and was always present at staff socials. He even married one of the French teachers, **Miss Berthou!** However, Duncan's legacy at AMVC is something that the College can be very proud of.

In 1990 Duncan set up the AMVC Duke of Edinburgh Award with a handful of Year 10 students and a minibus. From there it grew and within a few years the award at AMVC was flourishing. His team of **Mr Kitching, Mr Bushby, Mrs Mills** and, eventually me, saw the Award grow to cater for all three levels for Years 10 to 13 and, when the reins were passed on to me in 1998, AMVC was one of the largest and most successful Award centres in the region (if not further afield). The success of the Award is down to Duncan's passion and commitment and these were qualities which **Mr Walls** and I endeavoured to maintain when we took it on and which Duncan employed in his later position as Headteacher at a school in Bath.

Sadly, Duncan died aged 46 earlier this month leaving

behind his wife Steph and his two daughters. His passion of working with, and for young people, will be sadly missed by all who knew him.




COLLEGE NEWS

New Gymnasium and Innovation Centre

As you may know the Local Authority have a duty to ensure a number of Applied Learning subjects via Diplomas are available across Peterborough schools by 2013. The College has entered into discussion with the Local Authority with a view to accepting on our campus the facility to teach Manufacturing and Product Design as the subject most akin to our generally academic ethos and, of course, our Technology status.

additional subject, accommodate this specialist accommodation is required. I am pleased to be able to confirm that design work is currently progressing for the construction of a new gymnasium facility for the College. This gymnasium would be positioned adjacent to the swimming pool at the rear of the site, and would provide a similar sized gym area to the existing gymnasium however, with a significantly increased floor to ceiling height to facilitate trampolining and badminton. It will also provide changing facilities and equipment store rooms. Plans for this new building are shown below.



On completion of the new gymnasium, the plan is for the existing gymnasium to be converted into a new Innovation Centre to provide modern teaching facilities with a 'workplace environment' to allow 14-19 year olds, from both AMVC and other local schools / colleges, to study for the new Manufacturing and Product Design Diploma. Both projects are to be funded by Peterborough City Council.

Although the Cabinet Member for Children's Services has yet to approve the project the Local Authority will shortly submit a planning application in respect of the possible change of use of our current gym and construction of a new one.

The AMVC Ski Trip is an institution. It has been part of the College calendar for over 20 years. On Friday 13 February, 42 Sixth Form pupils and 5 members of staff set off on Ski 09. We returned to the resort we enjoyed so much last year, Val di Fiemme in the Trentino region of Italy. It's always a risk returning to a destination that you have enjoyed as it may not live up to the expectations in some way. To be honest, I think the destination was partly irrelevant as the pupils on the trip made it the success that it was. Many came with us last year but we had 17 that joined us for the first time. The snow was fantastic, the weather cold but sunny.



As with all trips, there are moments of stupidity and on the ski trip we don't like to let these pass unnoticed, so we have 'the jumper' award, which recognises daily any incidents of note. This years winners didn't let us down.

Of particular note was **Hari Soni** who seemed desperate to get the award, achieving more nominations than anyone else. We eventually gave in and let him have it for numerous incidents on the ski slopes. Also worth mentioning - **Sarah Owen** and **Luke Chapman** who seemed to be having a competition for who could say the daftest thing.

Skiing isn't an easy skill to learn and there were many pupils who, over the course of the week, had a problem to overcome. It may have been how to go forward a few metres without falling over for the beginners at the start of the week or, for the more experienced skier, the challenge of the first black run or a day where nothing seems to go right. Without fail the pupils showed great determination and courage to overcome the problems and the progress over the week was fantastic.

It is difficult to find the words to describe the attitude and behaviour of the young people we took—exceptional is the word that springs to mind. They threw themselves into every activity with enthusiasm. They were a delight, sensible and mature but also lots of fun. They didn't even



moan when both the journeys, there and back, were terrible. The company rep (who happens to be the ski company boss too!), ski school and hotelier were all full of praise for the positive attitude with which they approached everything. The progress in skiing was exceptional which is due in part to the excellent ski instructors but mainly the determination and willingness to listen and learn that the pupils demonstrated.

It was a pleasure to lead this trip and I was very proud to be a teacher at AMVC. To Y13 we bid a fond farewell - thank you for the spirit with which you took part and have many more great skiing adventures. In Flanders fields the poppies blow, Between the crosses row on row.

The Year 9 students recently encountered these pretty flowers on the annual trip to the Ypres area of Belgium to visit the World War One battlefields and their heads are bursting with the memories of the men who fought there and the men who died there.

Place of great history for tourists.

Next came Passchendale – the home of Tyne Cot, the largest British WWI cemetery in the world.

The trip began with our first view of the Western Front, when we embarked upon a memorial in Nieuwpoort. Next came a real eye-opener, when we travelled to St George's Cemetery in Ramskapelle, the resting place of several hundreds of British, Australian, American and Canadian infantrymen.

On Saturday, the best part of the day was the Last Post ceremony, which took place in Menin Gate – the memorial containing the name of thousands of unfound soldiers. The entire building was silent as the bugles rang out and blended

perfectly into a harmonious melody. The people who had gathered to watch the beautiful ceremony were completely quiet from 8.00 am onwards.

Talbot House, a regular building in Poperinge, home to hundreds of soldiers during the war, just an ordinary residential house, with everyday rooms and items. A fact that makes this house so magnificent: it is still up and running today, as a hotel for guests and a place of great history for tourists.

Next came Passchendale – the home of Tyne Cot, the largest British WWI cemetery in the world. Some fantastic photos were taken here! Standing at the very entrance, you could see up to 7 miles of hills and greenery. Although spectacular, every grave told a story, and another wall of Menin Gate expanded at the back, another few hundred names of missing soldiers written on it. A sad but true monument of inspiration and realisation.

A poppy wreath with our name on it remains at the cemetery and if we return when old and frail, we can look at the graves of the men who saved our country and think of what a wonderful job they did and how, without them, life would be

very different from how we know it.

Lest we forget the men who fought and died for England. Gone, but never forgotten.
