How to Compile Your Timetable

There are various considerations you should think through carefully as you decide what your timetable should consist of:

- ✓ Progression
- ✓ The Timetable
- ✓ Enrichment
- ✓ Leadership
- ✓ Guidance and Review

Some elements are compulsory.

Progression

It is important to look beyond your Sixth Form studies and see where you can progress to. Consider whether the subjects you take now are relevant for what you would like to do later on or would other subjects be more suitable and offer a wider choice of options.

If you are still unsure of the suitability of your choices and the subsequent progression opportunities, do discuss your options with the teachers and/or careers advisors.

Timetable Structure

The timetable will operate on a 10-day cycle. Each day will consist of 6 x 50 minute periods. The school day will follow this pattern in September. Attendance to registration is compulsory.

One A Level subject equals 12/60 periods (ie 12 x 50 minute periods per 10 days). Double Vocational courses occupy approximately 24/60 periods. Enrichment courses occupy 3/60 periods and there is one Personal and Professional Development lesson.

Remember: Elements of leadership and work experience can be added (these can be included in the final total)

Enrichment

The College is anxious to promote a broader education than that specifically demanded by the traditional three A Level or four AS courses. Consequently we have established an Enrichment Curriculum at Post-16 level. This means that we offer and encourage you to develop certain core skills and to follow certain themes, by taking subjects in addition to those offered at A Level. Some of these subjects are compulsory. The Enrichment Curriculum simply means that the Sixth Form programme will offer you opportunities to pursue certain aspects of the following:

Themes

- Economic, Industrial and Community Awareness
- Social and Political Awareness
- Careers Education and Guidance
- Issues – Adult and Working Life
- Health Education
- Moral Awareness/Religious Belief
- Science and Technology
- The Arts
- Equal Opportunities
- Recreation and Physical Awareness
- Citizenship



Areas of Enrichment offered are:

- Professional Development
- Personal Development
- Leadership

All students must also select from one of the following:

- Community Sports Leader Award - CSLA
- Extended Project Qualification - EPQ
- St Johns Ambulance – First Aid Training
- Sixth Form Newsletter
- Young Enterprise
- Mentoring



Community Sports Leader Award - CSLA

The Level 2 Award in Community Sports Leadership is a nationally recognised qualification that enables successful candidates to independently lead small groups of people in sport and recreational activities.



The qualification teaches generic leadership skills such as organisation, planning, communication and teamwork through the medium of sport. It is a fun and practical qualification with no entrance requirements or final examinations to sit. Students need a positive attitude, need to interact well with youngsters, and to enjoy learning in a practical way. Assessment is continual by way of observation and written evidence.

Community Sports Leadership Level 2 consists of four units of work:

- 1 Developing leadership skills
- 2 Plan, lead and evaluate sport/physical activity sessions
- 3 Assist in planning and leading a sports/physical activity event

Optional units – the learner must complete one unit from Units 4 and 5

- 4 Lead sport/physical activity sessions linked with the centre
- 5 Lead sport/physical activity sessions in the community

Extended Project Qualification - EPQ

- EPQ is a skills-based qualification, assessed at A2 Level, whilst equivalent in size to an AS and graded A* to E. It offers the opportunity for learners to produce an extended piece of work (5000 words) in an area in which, they have a particular interest.
- There is much flexibility about the choice of a project topic - it can support personal aspirations for higher education and/or career development; add depth or breadth to a current topic/subject; or draw connections between different subjects.
- Provides good preparation for independent learning in higher education

Student comments include:

- *"It's high level and different to what we normally do in College".*
- *"We learned about subject matter in a different, more active way".*
- *"Increases motivation, confidence and responsibility".*

Past project examples include:

- Are mobile phones affecting health?
- Was the NATO led intervention in Libya of 2011 justified?
- Cultural comparison of Japanese Manga and American superhero comics.
- An analysis of the childhood traits of 'power-control' killers.
- Has the way we consume television been permanently changed by the rise of streaming sites?

St Johns Ambulance First Aid Training

Why should I get involved?

140,000 people die each year in situations where first aid could have helped save their lives - as many as die from cancer

You can never predict when you might be faced with a life or death situation. But if it comes to it, we want to make sure you have the skills and confidence to be the difference between a life lost and a life saved.

What does it entail?

There is a broad range of topics, where we'll look at how to recognise different conditions, protect people from further harm and promote their recovery. This will include everything from dealing with Asthma to using Zinc Oxide tape (actually it won't because we don't use that in First aid any more, but Spinal Injury is as far as the A-Z goes!).

Learning First Aid will give you something amazing – the confidence to do the right thing when it really counts.

Developing written styles, tackling social media content and liaising with the local media we will make the Sixth Form Newsletter a highlight within the school. Excellent for UCAS applications as well as experience for CV building, this enrichment is a fantastic opportunity to enhance your skills and explore your contribution to wider Sixth Form life.

Young Enterprise Company Programme

The Young Enterprise Company programme is led by business and will inspire and equip you to learn and succeed through enterprise. You will 'learn by doing', this involves setting up a company, coping with a changing and evolving business, producing a product and selling the product. Any profits will be shared between the Shareholders (which could be you!).

You will have the unique opportunity of working with local business people; this will help to give you an insight to the world of work. You will be introduced to many of the life skills and skills you will need in the workplace such as team working, decision making, innovation and the importance of good communication skills. In addition, you will gain an understanding of wealth creation especially if your company makes a profit.

As part of the programme you will have weekly meetings with your business advisor and you will have the opportunity to attend Trade Fairs in Stamford and Peterborough to sell your products alongside other Young Enterprise Companies.

Towards the end of the year, Young Enterprise companies take part in a series of high profile local and regional 'company of the year competitions'. Twelve regional winning companies from across the UK are selected each year to compete in the prestigious HSBC Young Enterprise Innovation Awards UK final.



Leadership

Leadership is an integral element of life in Arthur Mellows Sixth Form, which offers both a chance for students to develop personal skills in organisation, leadership and team work as well as providing an opportunity to demonstrate these abilities to take on responsibilities beyond their academic commitments.

This could range from running a Sixth Form Newspaper, establishing a Young Enterprise project, raising money for charity, running the Fairtrade initiative, whole school productions and Duke of Edinburgh. All ideas are welcome.

Within School

Leadership assistance is welcomed in all subject areas:

Maths, English, Vocational, Modern Languages, Art, Library and Resource Centre, Science, Music, Drama, Dance, Physical Education, Special Educational Needs, ICT and many others.

Out of School

Playgroups, Primary School Assistants, Hospital Volunteers (physiotherapy, plaster room, helping elderly...), Shopmobility (assisting less mobile around Queensgate), Wildfowl Trust, Nene Valley Railway.

Professional Development in the Sixth Form

All students will receive Careers information and guidance.

The aim is to ensure you are fully informed about options available to you after your examination courses finish and to help you make the transfer to non-school life as smooth as possible.

The Careers Team will be available to see you at any time while you are in the Sixth Form for guidance about your future.

Guidance and Review

You will review with your Tutor on an individual basis your timetable and progress in order to help formulate plans for the future. You may find it necessary to add to or alter your timetable in the light of advice received. You will obviously have a good deal of contact with your Tutor and he/she will normally be the person you turn to for advice on curriculum matters. Your Tutor is trained and aware of the demands of the 16+ curriculum and therefore you should utilise your Tutor's skills, viewing them as the "first port of call" to discuss matters. Review and guidance will be an ongoing process throughout your Sixth Form career and your Tutor will monitor your progress and in most cases will be responsible for compiling information for references.

Sixth Form Dress Code for Years 12 and 13

Purpose: For students to be dressed in smart, professional manner in preparation for the world of work.

This code is in line with the world of work and reflects the calibre of students we have at the College.

- ✓ A formal tailored jacket or blazer must be worn in black, navy or grey.
- ✓ A conventionally tailored business suit in black, navy or grey; plain or pinstripe. This can include a trouser suit or a skirt suit
- ✓ A smart office wear dress in black, navy or grey worn with a tailored jacket or blazer
- ✓ A formal or tailored waistcoat (optional)
- ✓ A formal collared shirt of any colour
- ✓ A blouse or collared shirt in any colour but plain in design.
- ✓ A conventional tie or bow tie (optional)

The following are **NOT** appropriate for Sixth Form:

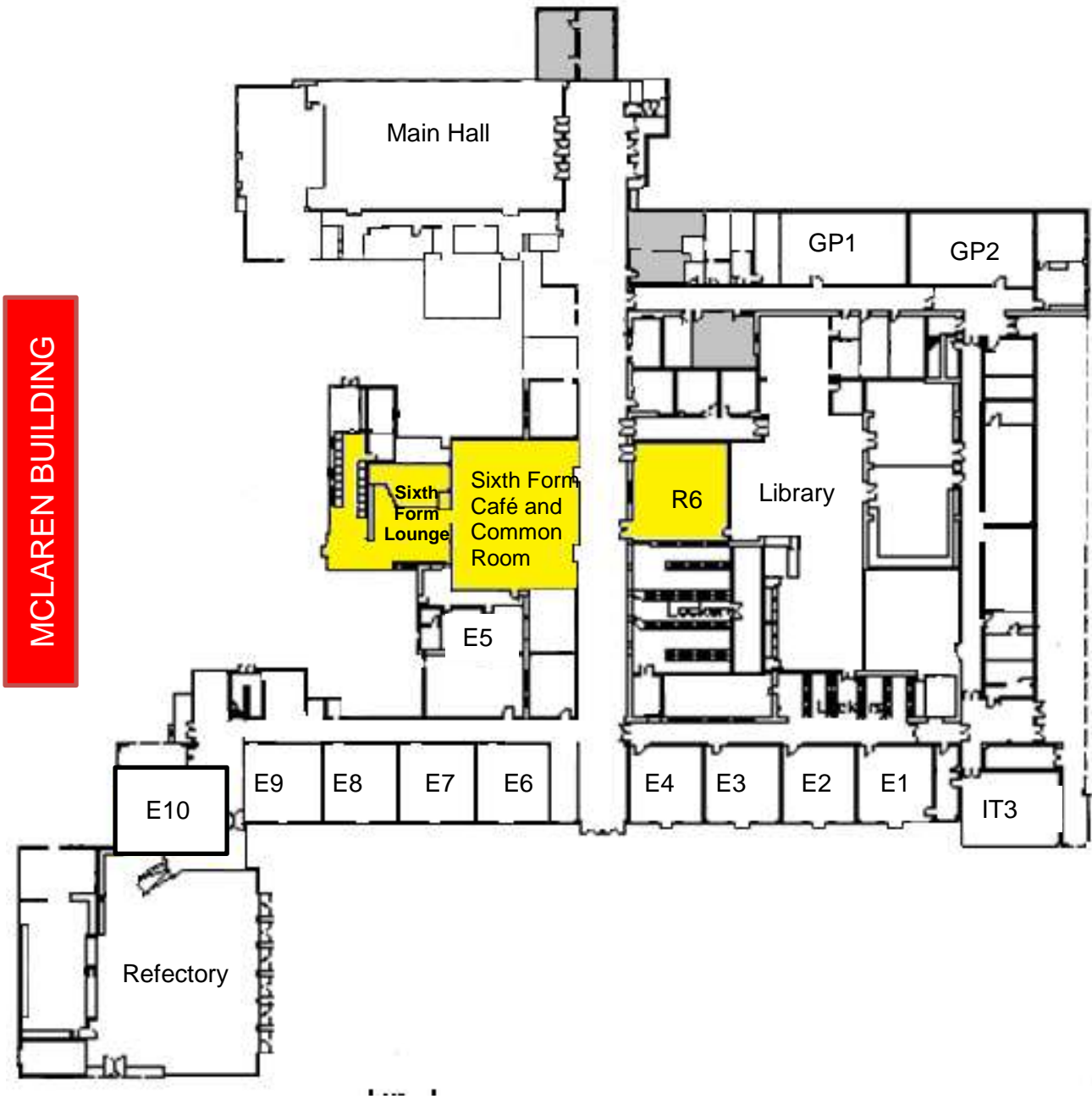
- X Any form of jeans or trousers that have the characteristics of jeans
- X Leggings or trousers which are too tight or shorts
- X Any clothing with bold branding or slogans
- X Heavy knit woolly jumpers and cardigans
- X Leather or denim skirts, trousers or jackets
- X Hoodies
- X Non formal boots, trainers, flip flops or any other casual footwear including canvas shoes
- X Anything that would be regarded as too revealing
- X Leisure style/T-shirt material or a strappy top
- X Extreme hair styles or unnatural colours
- X Facial piercings other than a discreet nose stud.

Enforcement:

	Student will be asked to remove the incorrect piece of uniform where possible which would be confiscated for the remainder of the day.
	Spoken to by Sixth Form tutor and SIMS email sent to parents/carers
	Spoken to by Sixth Form Leadership team, Gold or Silver card privileges removed.
	Ultimately if the student continues to flout the uniform rules which are part of the College expectations, student will be formally asked to leave the College.

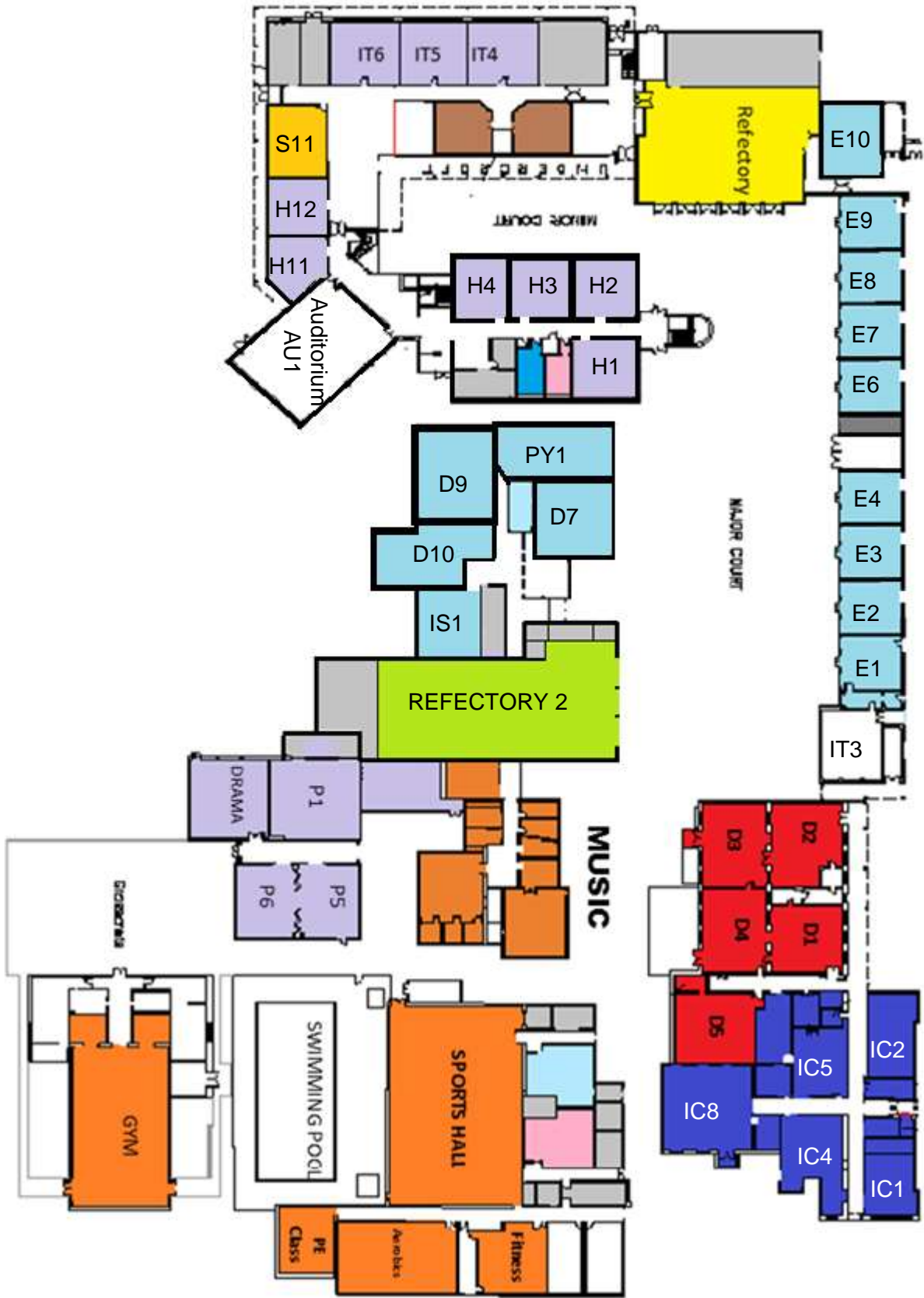

SITE MAP 2

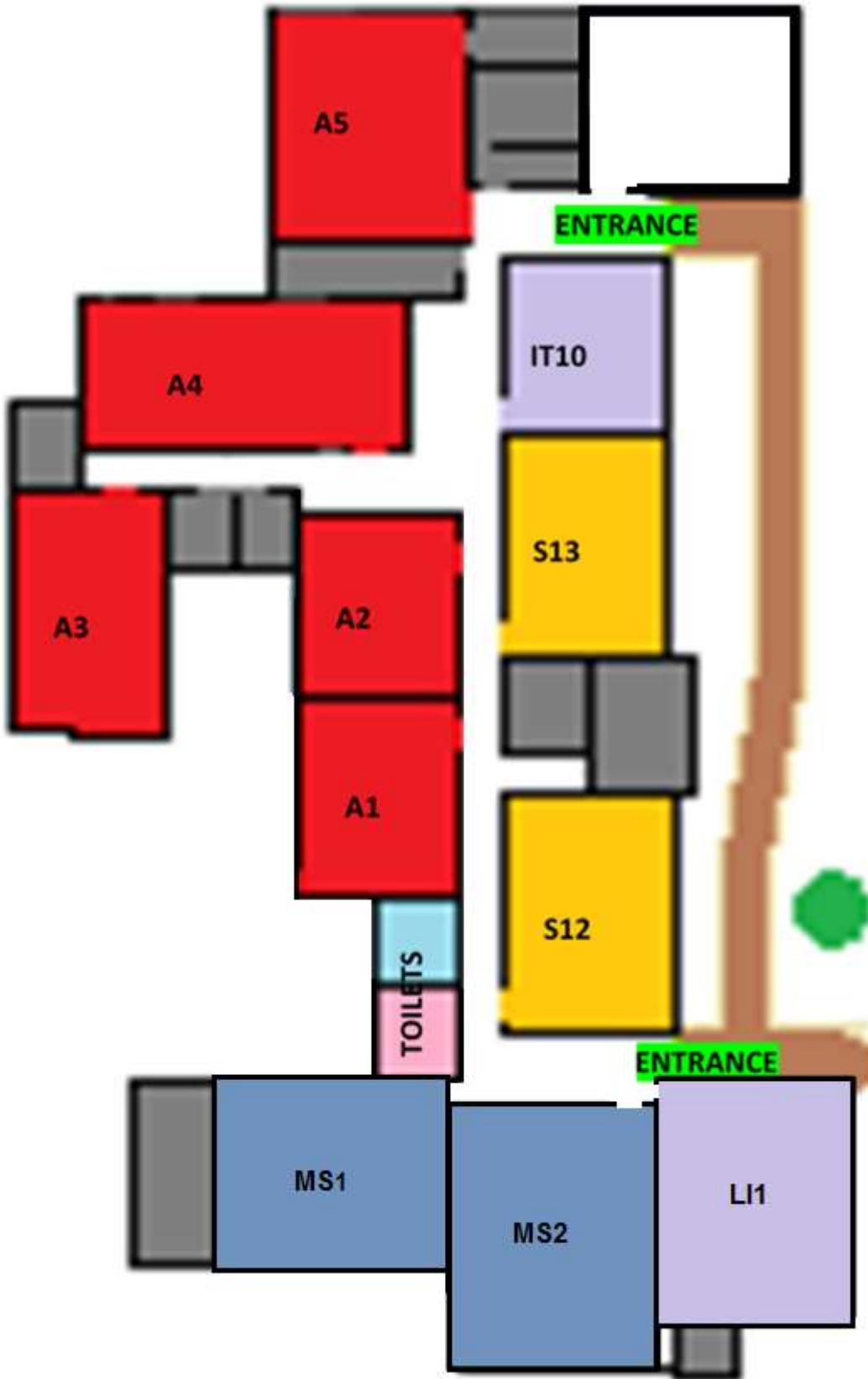
