THE USE OF **PUBLIC HIGHWAYS** TO AND FROM SCHOOL



If your son/daughter uses the Foxcovert Road between Peakirk Road and the railway bridge, please would you kindly make them aware that it is a narrow road used by both students and the public travelling general in directions. The road is accessible to residents in cars, farm vehicles, access to the railway and cyclists. Therefore, in the interest of safety please would students, - both walking and cyclingbe mindful of other pedestrians and road users. There have been times when the road is not passable as students cycling, and walking, are taking up the whole road.

Please remind your son/daughter to always cycle safely. Cycling two or three abreast is unsafe; there have been reports of students cycling four abreast, with their hands off the handle bars and cutting across parked cars in a dangerous way. Whilst we appreciate this may be a minority of students, I would ask if you could raise this with your son /daughter to reinforce the message of safe behaviour, both for themselves and others.

PARKING AND HIGHWAY RESTRICTIONS

To help prevent accidents between motorists and children, could we politely ask all parents to park considerately and safely. Our neighbours have also requested that parking should always be considerate and driveways, and access points, are not blocked. Please remember that parking is **NOT ALLOWED** on the yellow zig zag areas marked 'SCHOOL KEEP CLEAR' when dropping off and collecting students from school. Please also remember to avoid parking on the pavement, so that access for pedestrians and pushchairs does not become an issue an issue.

FREE SCHOOL MEALS

You are entitled to free school meals for your children if you receive:

- Income Support
- Income based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, an annual income below £16,190 and no **Working Tax Credit.**
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

Please note: If you, or your partner, receive any working tax credit you will not be entitled to free school meals. This condition has been set by the Government and is outlined in the Education Act 2002.

The application form must be completed by the person who receives the qualifying benefit which can be requested from the Finance Department.

If your child is entitled to free school meals but you are reluctant to take advantage of this entitlement, talk to us about your concerns. We will try to put your mind at rest. If you still decide not to take the free school meals, we still encourage you to apply. You don't have to accept the free school meals but you will show on our records as being entitled. The more children who are shown as being entitled to free school meals, the more funding the school will receive. This ultimately benefits your children.

WORK EXPERIENC

All students in Year 10 are taken off timetable the last 2 weeks of the Summer Term to attend a work experience placement with a local employer.

The dates are: Monday 11 July 2016 to Friday 22 July 2016.

By now, every student will have been issued their unique PIN Number which allows them to access the current work experience database. All students will be taken through the system in a Life Skills lesson; however, the system can be accessed anywhere with internet access by logging on to: https://

their PIN pss.learnaboutwork.net using

Number.

Students can search the database using company names, vocational areas and/or geographical areas. They are asked to choose 6 different jobs, all of which they would be happy to go to. The system will automatically 'lock down' on Friday, 13 November 2015. Students will receive their printed forms from Mrs Crick or their Form Tutor by Friday, 20 November 2015 to bring home for parent/ carer signatures.

Completed forms must be with Mrs Crick by Thursday, 3 December 2015 at the latest.

If students wish to find their own placement, students can collect the appropriate paperwork from Mrs Crick, but be aware these forms also have to be back by Friday, 20 November 2015.

Once a placement has been secured, students will be given a Job Description and Risk Assessment of the tasks via their Form Tutor. All students will be required to contact their employer to arrange and attend an informal interview.

CONGRATULATIONS - TAYLOR ROBERTS-MITCHELL

On Tuesday 7 July 2015, Taylor Roberts-Mitchell was placed with 'The Glass Slipper', on work experience. Taylor was tasked with the re-design of a dress that the company had at The Glass Slipper. Taylor's brief was to re-design the dress before it was pulled apart and reconstructed to match the design.

Taylor presented her designs to her employer, Kris, at the close of the day. Kris stated that the designs were very imaginative and to say that they were impressed would be an understatement. The Glass Slipper have been designing and producing formal gowns for some years now. Kris felt that Taylor's designs were to the standard they would expect of someone far beyond her years.

Taylor has continued her work, designing reconstructing the garment and completed the project. Taylor will be keeping the dress that she worked on during her Work Experience.

Kris commented that whilst Taylor was with The Glass Slipper, they saw a very skilled and creative "Taylor designer emerge. demonstrated remarkable maturity not only in her interactions with us but with customers and her work."

Following the Work Experience, The Glass Slipper' have offered Taylor a job and are delighted that Taylor has accepted. She will be undertaking paid work as a designer of bespoke wedding dresses, bridesmaid dresses and

formal gown wear for 'The Glass Slipper'.

During the Summer holidays, Taylor worked 2 days per week, four hours each day. Taylor has been offered work during term time, that is appropriate (ie not on a school day) and will support her studies as she approaches GCSE's.

Taylor has been tasked with the design of a bridal gown and bridesmaids dresses, that once produced by the dress making team at 'The Glass Slipper' will be their dress of the month in the future. As an example, their July dress of the month had a total reach of more than 28,000 people, in excess of 250 comments on social media and saw clients travelling from as far a field as Lancashire, South Wales and Scotland to place orders.

Kris is very keen to see Taylor progress on beyond secondary

education to higher education. Kris stated: "Whilst practical experience a company designing garments has value, we feel that encouraging Taylor towards higher education will see her more likely to achieve her long term goals. We plan to work closely with Taylor and her mother in encouraging her with her studies."

Well done, Taylor, for making the most out of your Work Experience.
