

WORLD WAR 1 ARMISTICE COMMEMORATION POETRY AND ART COMPETITION CELEBRATIONS 6-8 NOVEMBER 2018

Arthur Mellows Village College Library, along with the Cover Supervisor, Mr Auty held a Poetry and Art competition to commemorate 100 years since the end of World War 1.

This was open to all year groups across the school and there was an overwhelming number of entries, mostly from the newest members of the College, our keen and industrious Year 7s (special thank you to Miss Betts' and Miss Kruse's English classes and Miss Brown's Art classes).





All of the entries were displayed in the library alongside well known poems written by famous war poets. There were five top prize winners each receiving an Amazon voucher and a World War 1 book.

To celebrate the competition, the library held a World War 1 themed tea party during which students were treated to a Trench Cake, baked to the original 100 year old recipe. Originally, this cake was lovingly baked by the families of soldiers and sent to them through the post to eat in the trenches. Students also had delights such as potted meat pinwheels, jam tarts, oat cakes and lemon drizzle cake washed down with a proper cup of tea from a teapot!

Also during our celebration week, Mr Auty showed the Peter Jackson film, "They Shall Not Grow Old" to Year 9s and above. It gave our students a vivid insight into the horrors of war and sacrifices made by soldiers not much older than themselves. The students who took part thoroughly enjoyed the experience even asking if we could do this every year!

The Pastoral Team (Mr Phillips, Mr Ware, Mrs Levy, Mrs Johnson, Mrs Gaduzo (Constable), Mrs Jones, Mrs Kamminga (School Counsellor) and the HYPA clinic nurses (Wednesday lunchtimes in IT3) are all readily available to talk to if you need some help.

We had an excellent first term; our mental wellbeing theme for that term was 'Give' and students took part in a challenge which encouraged them to do simple tasks and portray acts of kindness to their friends, families and teachers. No act of giving can ever be 'too small' when it is done to help someone out, or to make someone smile and we feel that many of the students now realise the positive impact such acts can have. Those students who had really gone that extra mile in giving to others last term have been recognised in assemblies and now hold the title of 'Student Wellbeing Ambassador' for the College.

Our theme for this term is 'Connect'. During this term we will be encouraging students to put their phones away, switch off the electronics and have a conversation; whether that be with their friends, family member or maybe another student they haven't spoken to before.

Feeling connected with others and being part of something can go a long way to making us feel good and can have a real positive impact on our mental wellbeing. Students will be encouraged to talk about how they are feeling, what interests them, what they like, what they dislike and to generally get to know each other that little bit better.



2019 County Swimming Championships

Ella Gerrard (Year 7) is a competitive swimmer with Deeping Swimming Club and successfully qualified for the 2019 County Championships in both the 50 metres and 100 metres Freestyle. At the championship she performed extremely well reaching the finals in both events and finishing 5th in the 50 metres with a personal best time of 32 seconds and 6th in 100 meters achieving a personal best of 71 seconds. Ella currently is in the County squad which involves over 11 hours of training per week including 9 hours in the pool, 2 circuit training sessions as well as before and after school sessions.
