Year 7 PGL Residential

As Friday approached, the long-lasted wait was over! The bus engine roared and the trip was well underway. Most people were mainly excited about who they were going to be sharing a room with, along with what activities they have in mind.

As we arrived we were welcomed by the enthusiastic team leaders who showed us around to make sure we knew where we were going. Eventually, we found out who else we were staying with in the room. For myself, I was in a room with Giovanni Potesta-Elliot, Fred Gibson and Oliver Belson.

From that point onwards, a whirlwind of events occurred. Some of these included: Raft Building, Archery, Orienteering, The Tunnel Trail, Problem Solving and my personal favourite, Quad Biking. The majority of them sounded like an adventure, so I was up for the challenge.

Archery: What I discovered about archery is that it is harder than it looks. There were a couple of different techniques and standing positions we could use with a lot more information about keeping your arm straight, put three fingers under the golden nugget (that's what they call it), pull your arm back so your thumb can just rub your chin and many more. As soon as we got into the games, I established that I wasn't as good as I thought I was, but after time and a bit more practice, I got better.

Quad Biking: What I loved so much about Quad Biking was the adrenalin. It was exhilarating to go around in circles as fast as you can and try and push the limits of the quad bike. I have been Quad Biking before, but it was a tiny circle and they held onto the back of you, so you couldn't go speeding off, laughing as you look behind your back. Overall it made you feel like a racer with the helmet, goggles and gloves. This was the most amazing activity in my opinion.

Problem Solving: This activity's job is to be hard and make your brain work and it certainly did that. Problem after problem, some easy, some hard. Most of the problems were difficult to start off but once our team got the hang of them, they became easier and easier. The skill of teamwork was used quite a lot during Problem Solving, we needed each other in different activities to help on the balance beam and make team decisions on where to place the poles we had to stand on, to get across without touching the wall. In conclusion, this was a brilliant and fun challenge that I enjoyed.

Finishing off with the tunnel trail as my piece of A4 paper is slowly filling up, we were blindfolded and in a line with unknown obstacles ahead of us. The challenge was to hold on the rope on the left hand side and hold the person's shoulder in front of us.

We had to manoeuvre through tyres, go upstairs and down ramps, through structures and building and dangling ropes.

We got to look back after we had completed it to see what we went through and what we recognised from the positioning of it. This was a ton of fun and was a laugh, when I bumped into a tree blindfolded.

PGL was a ton of fun and there is no doubt that I would give a lot to experience it again.

OVERNORS REPORT



During our Autumn cycle of meetings there were many items on the agendas which promoted discussion and debate; here are a selection of them:

In Curriculum and Standards we focused on this year's exam results and the steps being taken to prepare for next year's GCSE and A Level Examinations.

At the Students and Safeguarding meeting, Mrs Sludds took us through the Audit of statutory duties and associated responsibilities for schools in relation to 'Keeping Children Safe in Education'. We also looked at Mental Health Provision as well as Pastoral Data Analysis covering areas such as attendance and behaviour.

At the Local Governing Committee meeting we kicked off with a presentation by the Head Boy and Head Girl, Ben Milner and Corrine Wilding who told us all about their experiences in the role so far and about the good work they and the Sixth Form Committee are doing. It was then business as usual, as we reviewed reports from the Four Cs MAT on Finance, Property and Personnel, reports from the Head of College and on the College Self Evaluation.

Mr Hannah updated us on the Sixth Form Presentation Evening and the CEIAG award that the College is working towards. Our new Governors, Mrs Tomaselli, Mrs Lamond and Mr Dewdney are now in place and have started to get involved at our meetings.

This term, some of the Governing Committee, along with employers brought in by the Skills Service, have been helping out during the school day with mock interviews for Year 11 students, giving them the valuable experience of an interview and the opportunity to develop their soft skills.

We already have former students doing amazing things in the TV and film industries, and judging by the excited faces of our students on the coach home, hopefully we may have a few more in the future.


