## A2 course background

### A Level H505

- **Unit Y108:** The Early Stuarts and the Origins of the Civil War 1603-1660. Worth 25% of total A Level.
- **Unit Y216:** The USA in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century: Westward expansion and the Civil War 1803 – c1890. Worth 15% of total A Level
- **Unit 318:** Russia and its Rulers 1855 – 1964 worth 40% of total A Level
- **Unit 100:** Topic based essay (coursework based on The Cold War). Worth 20% of total A Level.



The Stuarts, USA and Russia (examined units) will be taught across Year 12 and Year 13. Coursework will be completed in Year 13.
